### **HTCC Director's Award**

Every year, the Director's Award is presented to a former honors program leader that HTCC recognizes for their contributions to community college honors education. The recipient of the Director's Award announces the first-place winner among the Outstanding Abstract Awards. This year's Director's Award goes to Joseph Holliday, Professor Emeritus of Geology from El Camino College.

### Joseph Holliday, El Camino College

Joseph Holliday is a Professor Emeritus of Geology from El Camino College, where he also served as Director of the Honors Transfer Program. Joe earned his BS degrees in Biology and Geology from Hamilton College, his MS in Geology from Oregon State University, and his MA in Education Administration from California State University. In 1992, Joe left a career in the oil industry to become a professor at El Camino College. Joe served as a professor in the Earth Science Department for 28 years, during which time he was also faculty advisor to several clubs, including the Science Club, the Native American Club, the LGBTQ Club, and the Honors Transfer Club. He won the El Camino's Distinguished Faculty Award in 2005. Joe's biggest legacy at El Camino, however, is the contribution he made to the college as Director of the Honors Transfer Program, a role he filled from 1994-2020. During that time, Joe oversaw the expansion of the program, from about 200 students to over 700. Beginning in 2010, he also implemented the co-director model of running the Honors Transfer Program, an arrangement that the college has since institutionalized. Joe also served on the UCLA Transfer Alliance Program Advisory Board for many years and presented numerous times at the National Collegiate Honors Council annual conference. He was a member of the Honors Transfer Council of California for 15 years, serving as HTCC president from 2007-2009. Now retired from El Camino College, Joe works for National Geographic, traveling to Antarctica, the Arctic Ocean, South America, and Iceland as a naturalist and guest speaker.

### **HTCC Director's Award**

The Honors Transfer Council of California will recognize the top research posters with an award accompanied by a cash prize. Posters will be judged on visual presentation, creativity, originality and reflection of sound scholarship. First, second, and third-place awards will be given for research posters in each of two categories, based on discipline.

### **Outstanding Abstract Awards**

These awards are conferred by the HTCC to four or more students who have submitted top-rated abstracts describing their conference presentation. The abstracts are judged on organization, quality of writing, and originality and importance of the research. The most highly ranked Outstanding Abstract earns the HTCC Directors Award.

#### The Directors Award

The Honors Transfer Council of California awards its Directors Award annually to the student who has submitted the finest presentation abstract and has been judged as exemplifying the qualities of an outstanding honors student. The Directors Award is presented by a former honors program leader that HTCC recognizes for their contributions to community college honors education.

### **Exemplary Achievement Scholarships**

The Honors Transfer Council of California gives awards to students graduating this year who show extraordinary achievement in scholarship, especially related to performance in an honors program. Students must be nominated by their honors director. These students display exceptional perseverance in overcoming obstacles to success in college or in an honors program.
